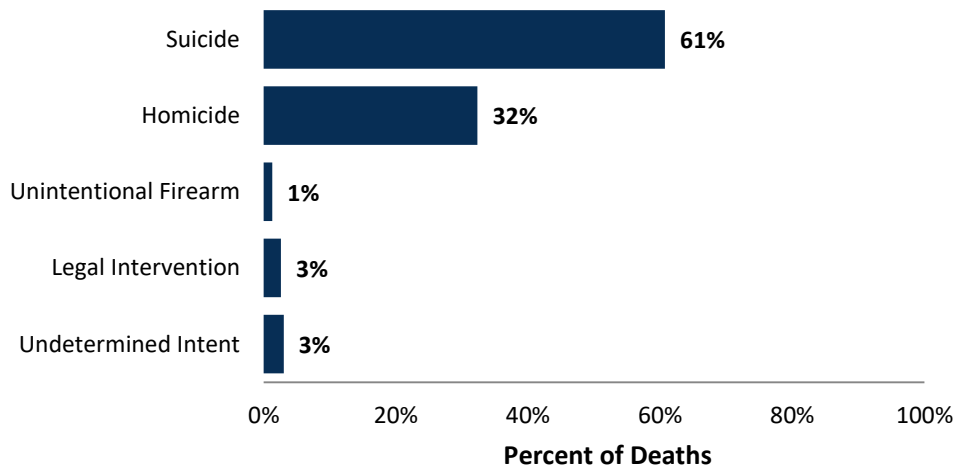


NC Violent Death Reporting System

VIOLENT DEATHS IN NORTH CAROLINA, 2024

The North Carolina Violent Death Reporting System (NC-VDRS) is a CDC-funded statewide surveillance system that collects detailed information on violent deaths that occur in North Carolina including: homicide, suicide, unintentional firearm deaths, legal intervention, and deaths of undetermined intent. NC-VDRS uses information from death certificates, medical examiner reports, and law enforcement reports to understand and aid in the prevention of violent deaths. Manner of Death: NC-VDRS, 2024

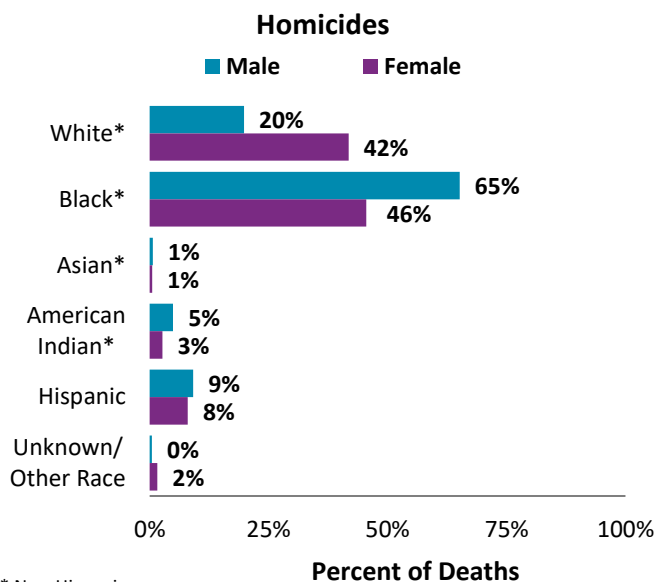


- In 2024, 2,616 North Carolina residents died by violence.

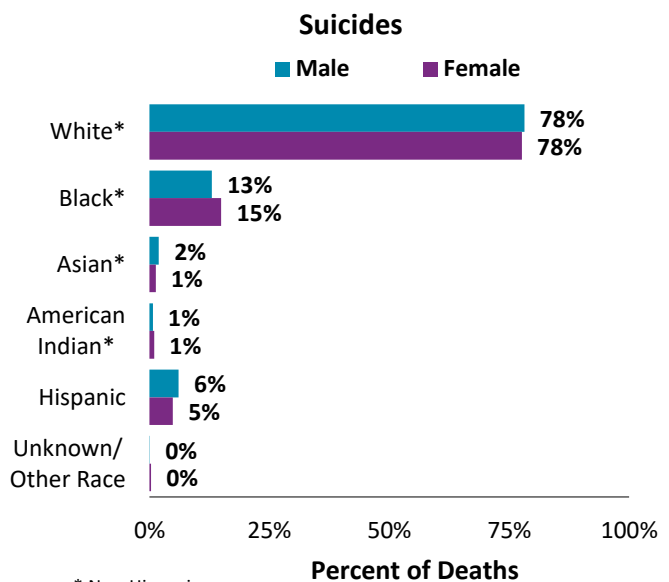
- There were 1,589 suicides (60.7%), 846 homicides (32.3%), 68 deaths from legal interventions (2.6%), 34 unintentional firearm deaths (1.3%), and 79 deaths of undetermined intent (3.0%) in 2024.

- The majority of suicide and homicide victims were male. Males accounted for 80.6% of suicide victims and 77.7% of homicide victims.
- Patterns of suicides and homicides differed by race. Most suicide victims were non-Hispanic (NH) White residents (78.0%), while 13.4% were NH Black residents.
- In contrast, 60.8% of homicide victims were NH Black residents, and 24.7% were NH White residents.

Violent Deaths by Sex and Race: NC-VDRS, 2024

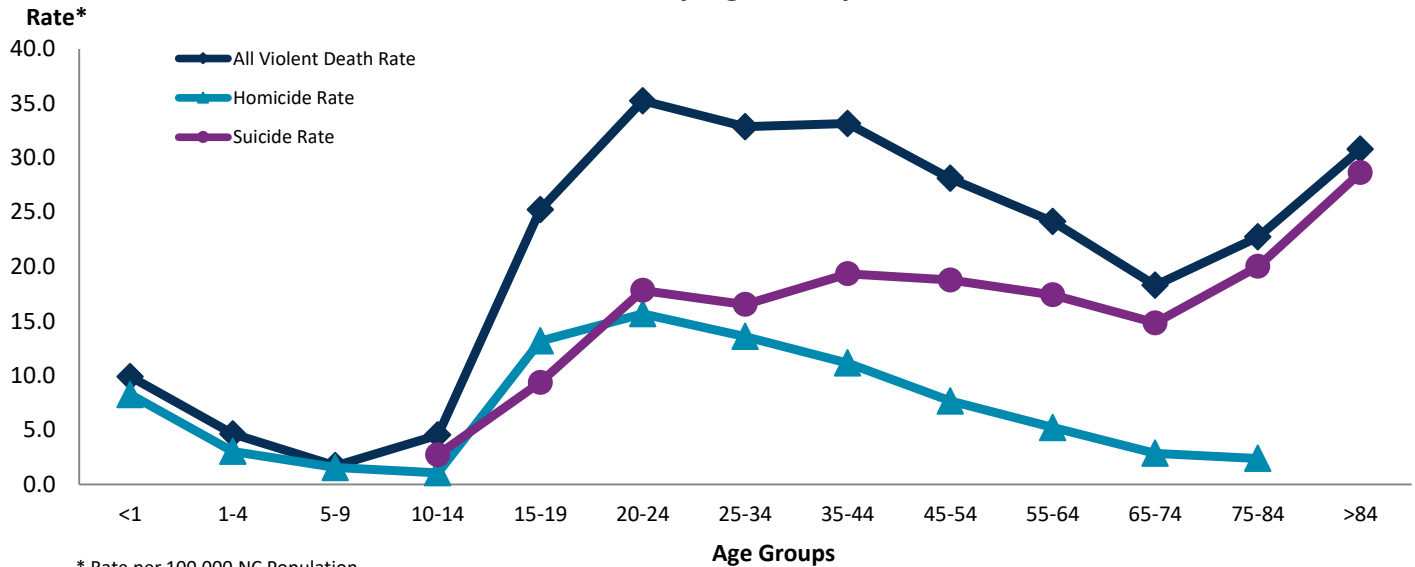

Violent Death Rates by Age Group : NC-VDRS, 2024*

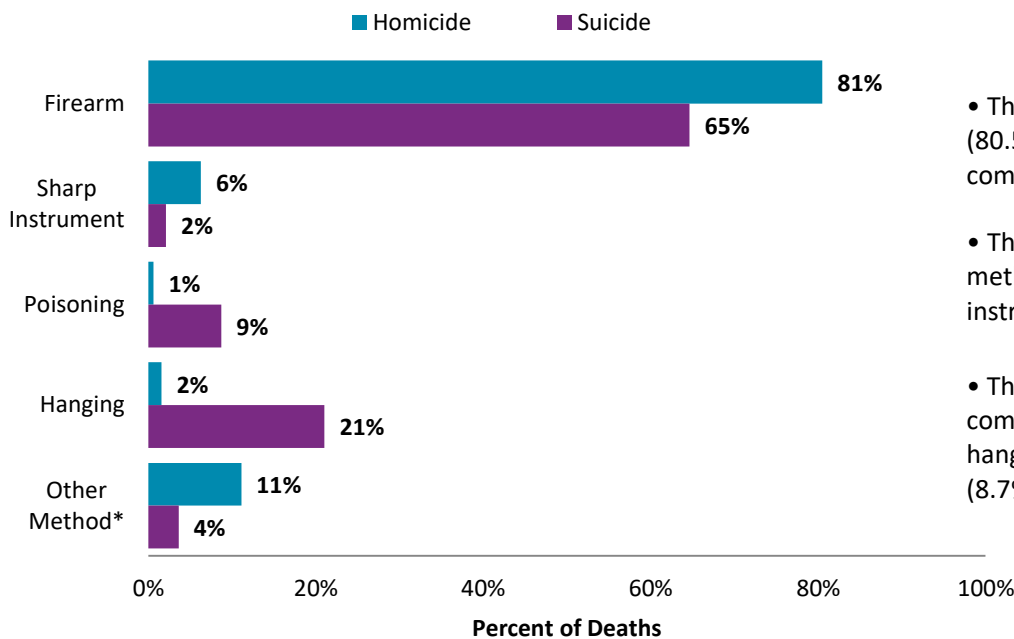


* Rate per 100,000 NC Population

Suicide data limited to ages 10 and older

- Suicide and homicide rates displayed different patterns by age.
- Homicide rates peaked in the 20- to 24- year age group.
- Suicide rates rose steadily from 10 to 24 years of age, stayed steady from 25 to 74, and rose again from 75 years and older. Suicide rates peaked among those ages 85 and older.

Method of Death: NC-VDRS, 2024



- The majority of homicides (80.5%) and suicides (64.6%) were committed using firearms.

- The second most common method of homicide was sharp instruments (6.3%).

- The second and third most common methods of suicide were hanging (21.0%) and poisoning (8.7%).

*Other includes fire/burns, unarmed assault, blunt trauma, falls, and other methods of death.
