

North Carolina Alcohol-Related Emergency Department (ED) Visits: Apr-Jun 2026* (Q2)

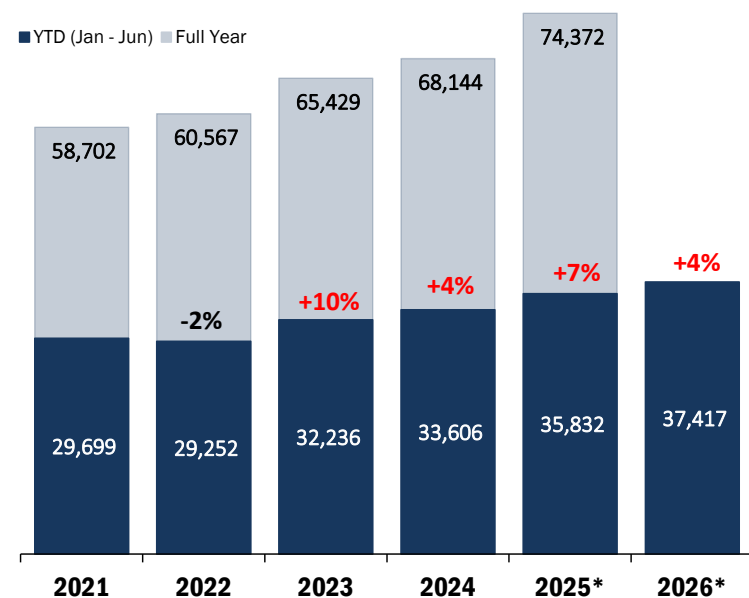

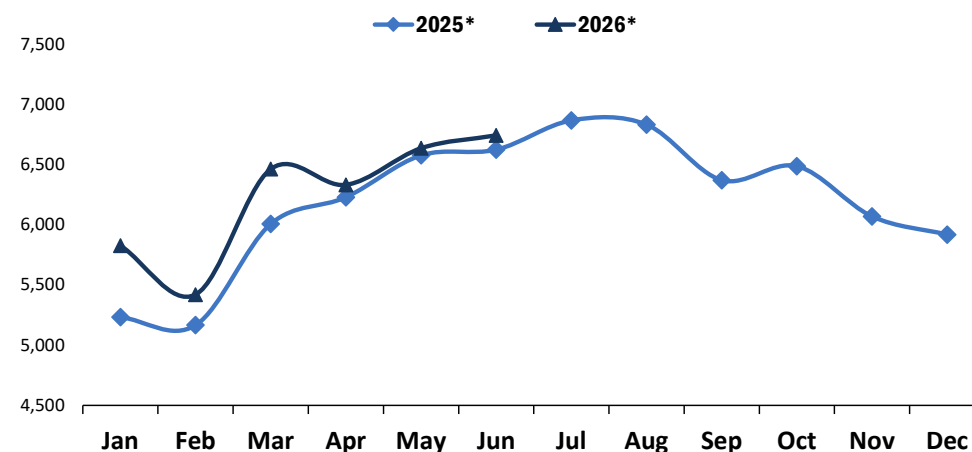
■ YTD (Jan - Jun) ■ Full Year

^ED data provide timely information on alcohol-related health outcomes.

Prior to 2025, the NC Injury & Violence Prevention Branch (IVPB) monitored ED visits for acute alcohol intoxication and alcohol misuse or dependence. However, alcohol use also contributes to other health problems, such as alcoholic liver disease, alcohol-induced pancreatitis, and other adverse health outcomes that can lead to ED visits.

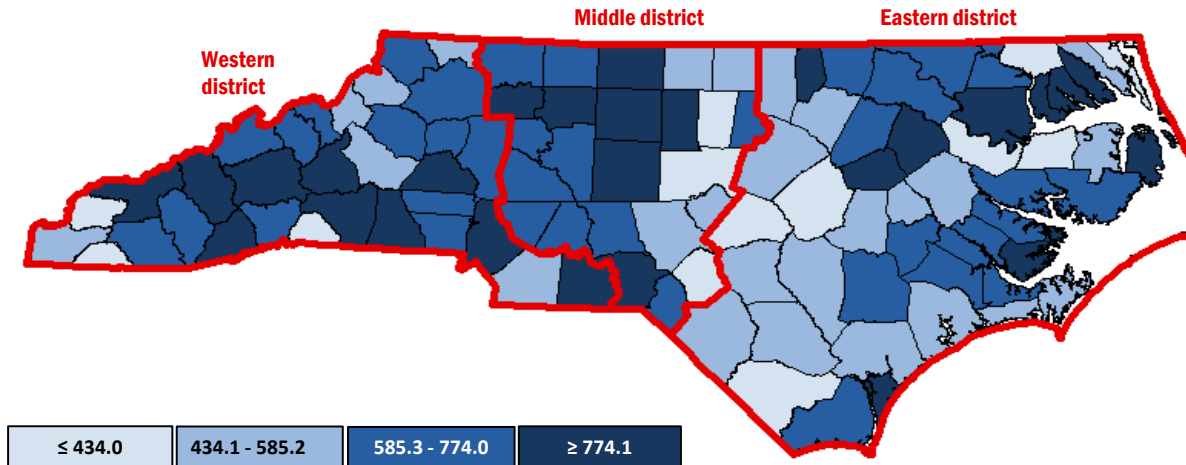
In 2025, IVPB expanded its monitoring of ED visits involving alcohol to include these additional alcohol-related health conditions.

Now, alcohol-related visits include events that involve alcohol use. Examples include immediate effects of alcohol use, like alcohol intoxication, as well as long-term conditions, like alcoholic liver disease.

Tracking these additional alcohol-related health outcomes will provide greater insight into the full impact of alcohol on NC's emergency departments.

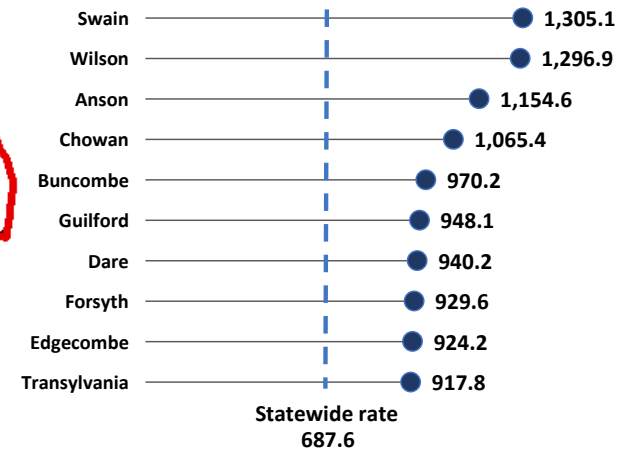
Counties with the highest alcohol-related^ rates tend to be in the western part of the state.

Rate per 100,000 residents



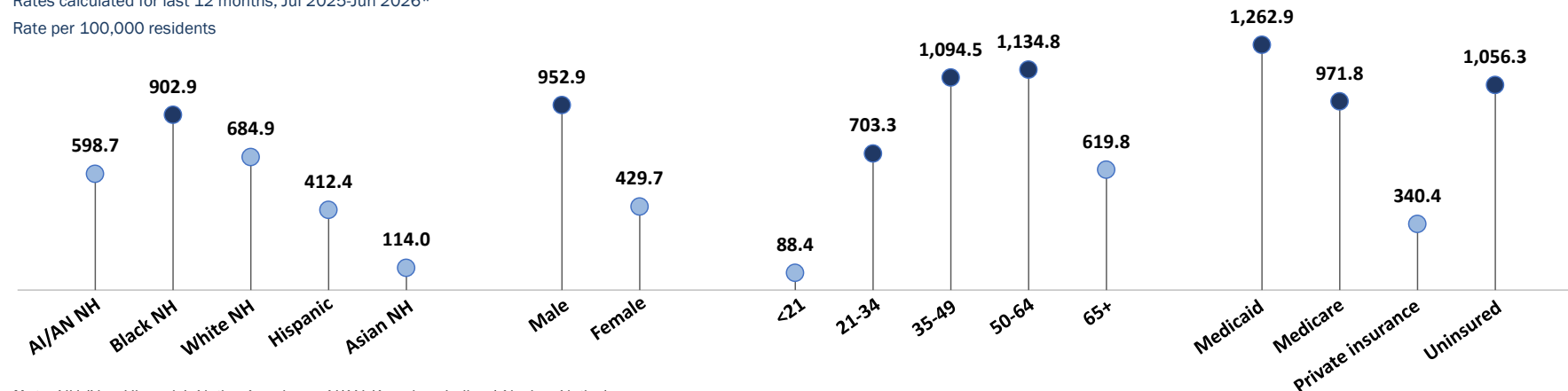
Counties with the 10 highest rates of alcohol-related^ ED visits.

Residents who are Black, male, ages 21-64, uninsured, or insured through Medicaid or Medicare had a higher rate of alcohol-related^ ED visits compared to the statewide rate of 687.6.

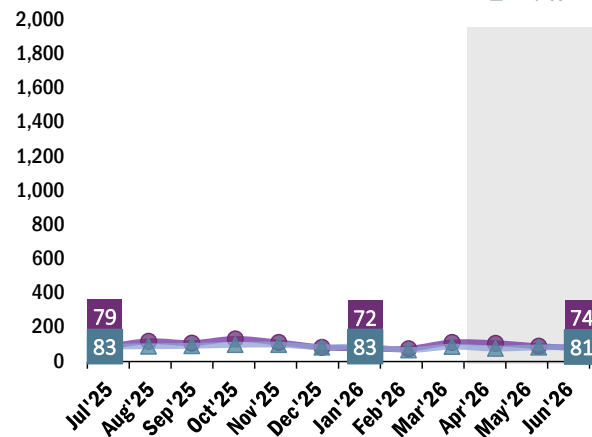

Rates of alcohol-related^ ED visits from Apr-Jun 2026 were highest among males ages 50-64 (1,782.1 per 100,000) followed by males ages 35-49 (1,576.4 per 100,000). Among females, rates of alcohol-related^ ED visits were highest among those ages 35-49 (730.9 per 100,000).

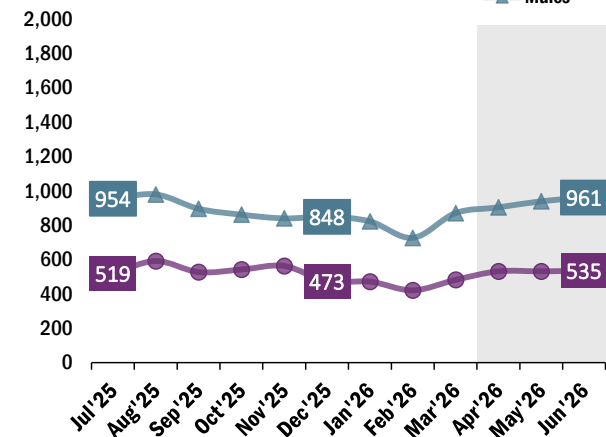
Ages 20 and Younger

Rate per 100,000



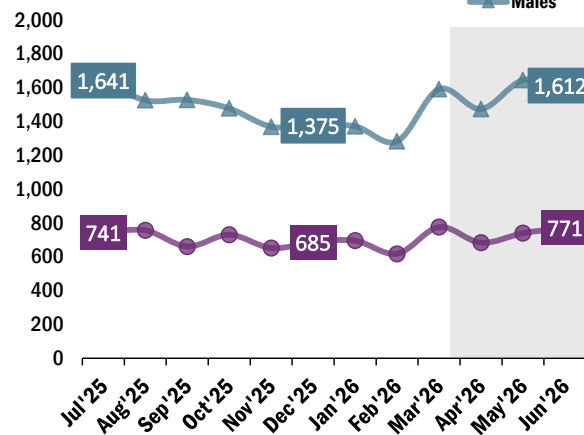
Ages 21-34

Rate per 100,000



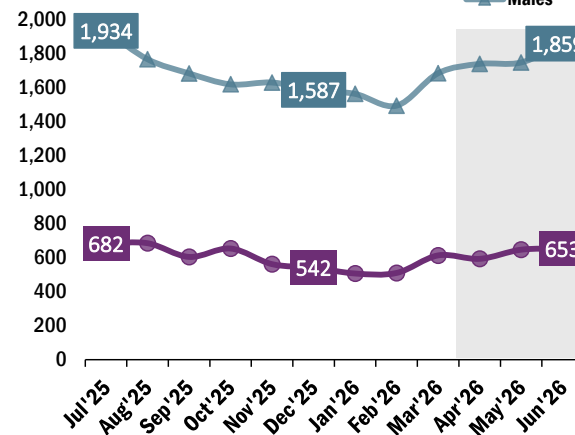
Ages 35-49

Rate per 100,000



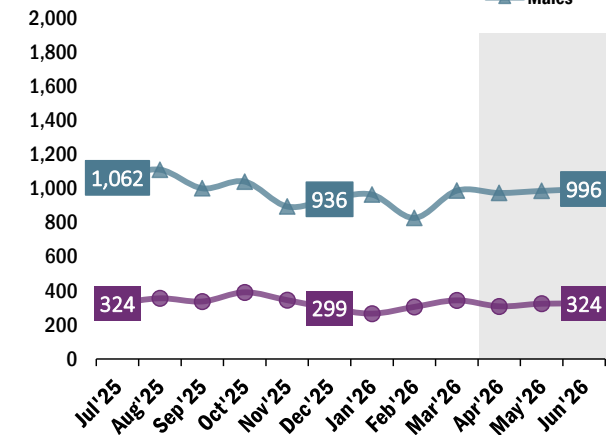
Ages 50-64

Rate per 100,000



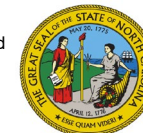
Ages 65 and Older
