
## NC Violent Death Reporting System

### **VIOLENT DEATH IN NORTH CAROLINA: CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT 11, 2023**


• An estimated 763,974 North Carolina residents reside in Congressional District 11.

• In 2023, there were 189 violent deaths from injuries sustained by individuals living in Congressional District 11.

• The majority of decedents were residents of Buncombe (39.7%), Henderson (14.3%), McDowell (6.9%), and Haywood (6.4%) counties.




Manner of Death: Congressional District 11, NC\*



• There were 150 suicides (79.4%), 23 homicides (12.2%), zero unintentional firearm deaths (0.0%), three deaths from legal intervention (1.6%) and 13 deaths of undetermined intent (6.9%).

- Firearms were involved in 67.3% of suicides and 65.2% of homicides.
- Among homicides caused by firearms, 86.7% were caused by handguns, 0% by shotguns, and 0% by rifles.
- Among suicides caused by firearms, 81.2% were caused by handguns, 15.8% by shotguns, and 3% by rifles.
- The second leading method of death for suicide was hanging, strangulation, or suffocation (23.3%).


#### Firearms were involved in 67.1% of all homicide and suicide deaths Method of Death: Congressional District 11, NC\*

The North Carolina Violent Death Reporting System (NC-VDRS) is a CDC-funded statewide surveillance system that collects detailed information on violent deaths that occur in North Carolina, including homicide, suicide, unintentional firearm deaths, legal intervention and deaths of undetermined intent. NC-VDRS triangulates information from death certificates, medical examiner reports, and law enforcement reports to understand and aid in the prevention of violent deaths. Data reported in this document are based on residential address of the victim and, instead of a rate, the ratio is reported. This document summarizes fatal injuries from violence that occurred in Congressional District 11 for the year 2023. Since not all deaths resulting from violence are able to be geocoded, the violent death numbers represented in this fact sheet may be slightly underestimated. Page 1 of 2

Age Group

- Suicides and homicides displayed different age patterns.
- Percentage of total homicides peaked among those 25-34 with 34.8% of total homicides, where percent of total suicides peaked among those 45-54 with 22.0% of total suicides.
- Percentage of overall violent deaths peaked among those 45-54 at 21.2% of total violent deaths.

• The majority of suicide and homicide victims were male. There were 118 male suicide victims and 16 male homicide victims, which accounted for 78.7% and 69.6% of victims, respectively.

• There were 32 female suicide victims and 7 female homicide victims, which accounted for 21.3% and 30.4% of victims, respectively.



Manner of Death by Sex: Congressional District 11, NC\*



#### Uneven distributions are seen among race and manner of death

Manner of Death by Race: Congressional District 11, NC\*



- Patterns of suicide and homicide differed by race. 88.7% of suicide victims were Non-Hispanic (NH) White while only 2.7% were NH Black.
- In contrast, 30.4% of homicide victims were NH Black, and 60.9% were NH White.
- Overall, there were 6 (3.2%) Hispanic, 159 (84.1%) NH White, 14 (7.4%) NH Black, 7 (3.7%) NH American Indian, and 2 (1.1%) NH Asian victims.
