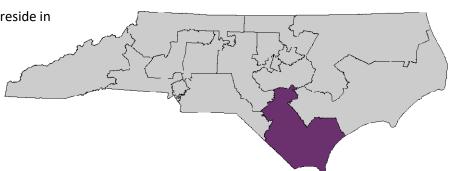
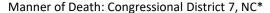

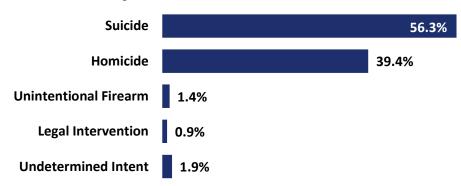
VIOLENT DEATH IN NORTH CAROLINA: CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT 7, 2023

• An estimated 794,214 North Carolina residents reside in Congressional District 7.

- In 2023, there were 213 violent deaths from injuries sustained by individuals living in Congressional District 7.
- The majority of decedents were residents of Cumberland (33.8%), New Hanover (22.1%), and Brunswick (15.5%) counties.



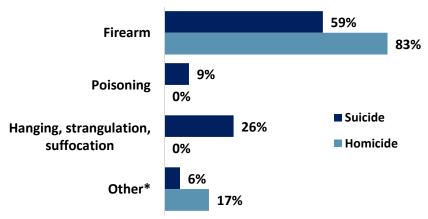




 There were 120 suicides (56.3%), 84 homicides (39.4%), three unintentional firearm deaths (1.4%), two deaths from legal intervention (0.9%) and four deaths of undetermined intent (1.9%).

- Firearms were involved in 59.2% of suicides and 83.3% of homicides.
- Among homicides caused by firearms, 80% were caused by handguns, 0% by shotguns, and 10% by rifles.
- Among suicides caused by firearms, 84.5% were caused by handguns, 12.7% by shotguns, and 2.8% by rifles.
- The second leading method of death for suicide was hanging, strangulation, or suffocation (25.8%).

Firearms were involved in 69.1% of all homicide and suicide deaths Method of Death: Congressional District 7, NC*



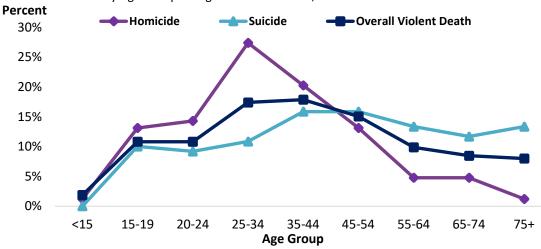

The North Carolina Violent Death Reporting System (NC-VDRS) is a CDC-funded statewide surveillance system that collects detailed information on violent deaths that occur in North Carolina, including homicide, suicide, unintentional firearm deaths, legal intervention and deaths of undetermined intent. NC-VDRS triangulates information from death certificates, medical examiner reports, and law enforcement reports to understand and aid in the prevention of violent deaths. Data reported in this document are based on residential address of the victim and, instead of a rate, the ratio is reported. This document summarizes fatal injuries from violence that occurred in Congressional District 7 for the year 2023. Since not all deaths resulting from violence are able to be geocoded, the violent death numbers represented in this fact sheet may be slightly underestimated.

Manner of Death by Age Group: Congressional District 7, NC*



- Suicides and homicides displayed different age patterns.
- Percentage of total homicides peaked among those 25-34 with 27.4% of total homicides, where percent of total suicides peaked among those 35-44 with 15.8%
- Percentage of overall violent deaths peaked among those 35-44 at 17.8% of total violent deaths.

- *Age group percents are taken of total homicide, total suicide and total overall violent deaths
- The majority of suicide and homicide victims were male. There were 92 male suicide victims and 65 male homicide victims, which accounted for 76.7% and 77.4% of victims, respectively.
- There were 28 female suicide victims and 19 female homicide victims, which accounted for 23.3% and 22.6% of victims, respectively.

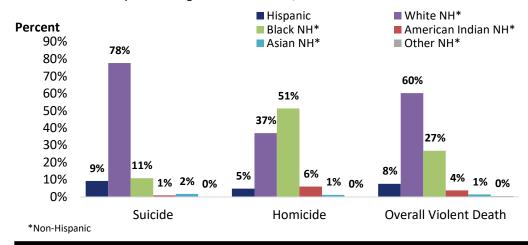
Males consistently have higher proportions of violent deaths than females

Manner of Death by Race: Congressional District 7, NC*



- Patterns of suicide and homicide differed by race. 77.5% of suicide victims were Non-Hispanic (NH) White while only 10.8% were NH Black.
- In contrast, 51.2% of homicide victims were NH Black, and 36.9% were NH White.
- Overall, there were 16 (7.5%) Hispanic, 128 (60.1%) NH White, 57 (26.8%) NH Black, 8 (3.8%) NH American Indian, and 3 (1.4%) NH Asian victims.
