

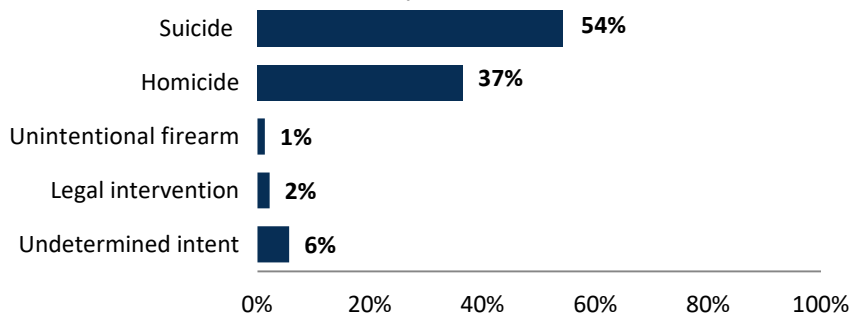
NC Violent Death Reporting System

VIOLENT DEATH IN NORTH CAROLINA: PITT COUNTY INCIDENTS, 2015-2024

The North Carolina Violent Death Reporting System (NC-VDRS) is a CDC-funded statewide surveillance system that collects detailed information on violent deaths that occur in North Carolina, including: homicide, suicide, unintentional firearm deaths, legal intervention, and deaths of undetermined intent. NC-VDRS uses information from death certificates, medical examiner reports, and law enforcement reports to understand and aid in the prevention of violent deaths. Data reported in this document are based on the county where the death occurred rather than county of residence.¹ Visit the [NC-VDRS page](#) within the Injury and Violence Prevention Branch website for more information.

¹ The occurrent ratio is used instead of the rate. This statistic is derived from the total number of violent deaths resulting from injuries in a specified geographic region divided by the number of residents in the region.

Manner of Death: Pitt County, NC: NC-VDRS, 2015-2024*



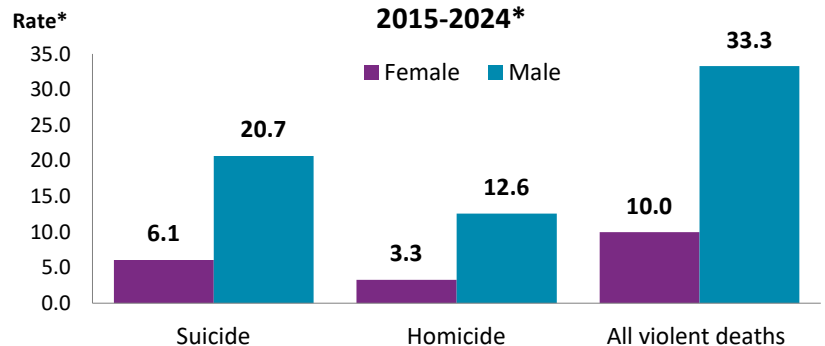

- For the years 2015-2024, there were 372 violent deaths from injuries sustained in Pitt County. Of these 372 deaths, 369 were NC residents (99.2%) and 330 were Pitt County residents (88.7%).

- There were 202 suicides (54.3%), 136 homicides (36.6%), five unintentional firearm deaths (1.3%), eight deaths from legal intervention (2.2%), and 21 deaths of undetermined intent (5.6%).

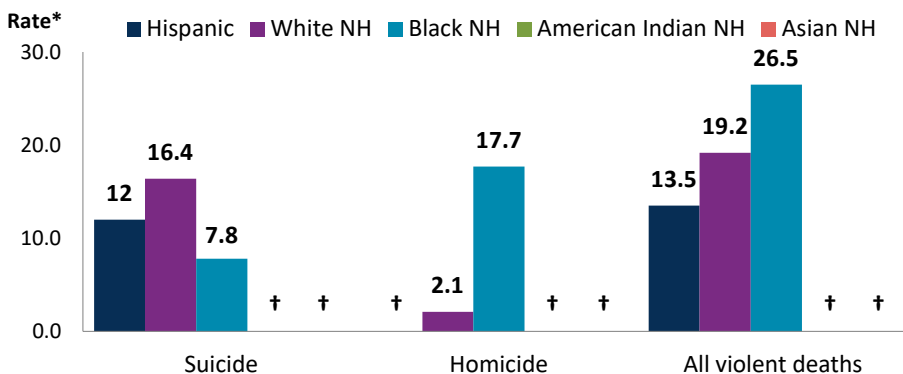
- In Pitt County, the suicide ratio was 3.4 times higher in males than in females, and the homicide ratio was 3.8 times higher in males than in females.

Manner of Death by Race/Ethnicity: Pitt County, NC: NC-VDRS,



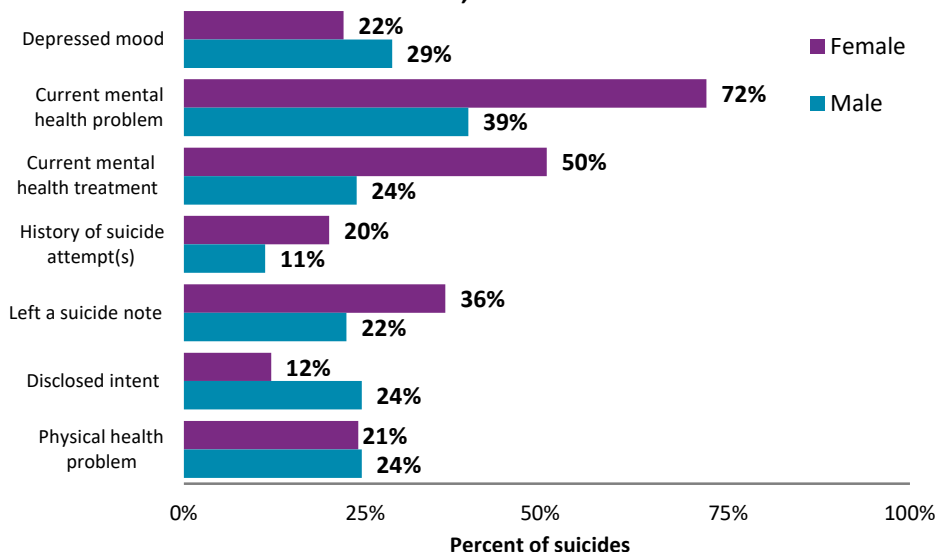
*Rate per 100,000 based on the county of injury occurrence. † Rate suppressed, 1-4 deaths.

- The suicide rate was highest for non-Hispanic (NH) White victims (16.4 suicides per 100,000 population) followed by Hispanic victims (12.0 per 100,000).
- In contrast, the homicide rate was highest among NH Black victims (17.7 per 100,000 population) followed by NH White victims (2.1 per 100,000).

- Suicides and homicides displayed dissimilar age patterns. Homicide rates peaked among those aged 25-34 with 14.0 homicides per 100,000, while suicide rates peaked among those aged 85 and older with 27.1 suicides per 100,000.
- Nearly three quarters of homicides (74.3%) and over half of suicides (64.4%) involved firearms.
- Suspicion of intoxication was reported in 6.6% of homicides and 15.3% of suicides.
- For homicide incidents where one or more suspects were identified, the relationship of the victim to the suspect was known (current or former spouse/boyfriend/girlfriend, family, friend or acquaintance) more frequently for female (83.9%) than for male (53.3%) victims.

Circumstances of Suicides: Pitt County, NC:

*Based on the county of injury occurrence, 95.5% of cases had circumstance information. One female and eight males were missing circumstance information.

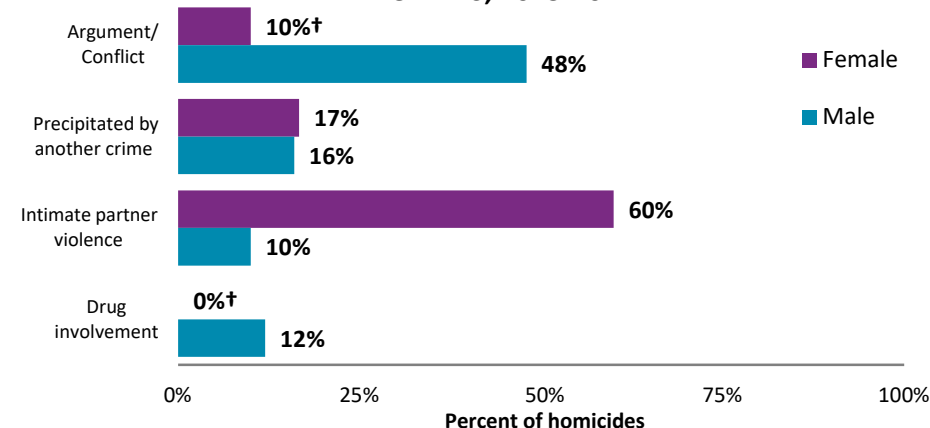
- Twenty-nine percent (28.7%) of male and 22.0% of female Pitt County suicide victims with circumstance information were characterized as being currently depressed when they died by suicide.

- Seventy-two percent (72.0%) of female and 39.2% of male suicide victims were characterized as having a current mental health problem.

- Females (20.0%) were more likely to have attempted suicide in the past as compared to males (11.2%).

Circumstances of Homicides: Pitt County, NC:

- Arguments or conflicts were more likely to be a contributing factor for male homicides (48.0%) than for female homicides (10.0%).

- Almost seventeen percent (16.7%) of female homicides and 16.0% of male homicides were precipitated by another crime such as robbery, burglary, or drug trafficking.

- Intimate partner violence was a contributing factor in 60.0% of female homicides, but only 10.0% of male homicides.
