

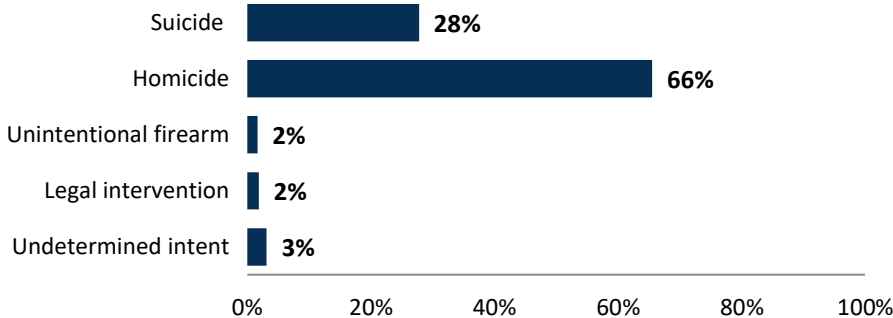
NC Violent Death Reporting System

VIOLENT DEATH IN NORTH CAROLINA: ROBESON COUNTY INCIDENTS, 2015-2024

The North Carolina Violent Death Reporting System (NC-VDRS) is a CDC-funded statewide surveillance system that collects detailed information on violent deaths that occur in North Carolina, including: homicide, suicide, unintentional firearm deaths, legal intervention, and deaths of undetermined intent. NC-VDRS uses information from death certificates, medical examiner reports, and law enforcement reports to understand and aid in the prevention of violent deaths. Data reported in this document are based on the county where the death occurred rather than county of residence.¹ Visit the [NC-VDRS page](#) within the Injury and Violence Prevention Branch website for more information.

¹ The occurrent ratio is used instead of the rate. This statistic is derived from the total number of violent deaths resulting from injuries in a specified geographic region divided by the number of residents in the region.

Manner of Death: Robeson County, NC: NC-VDRS, 2015-2024*



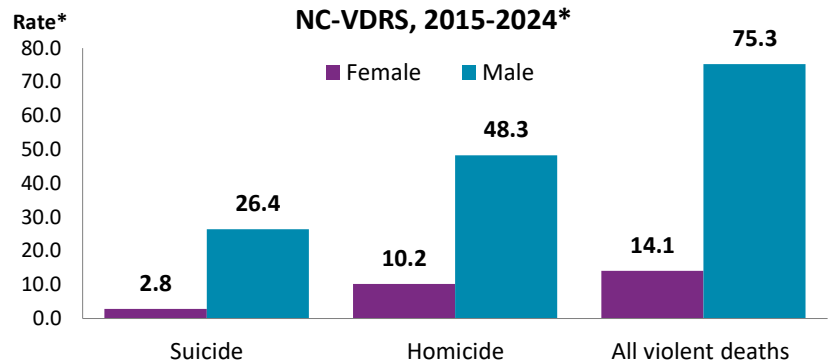

- For the years 2015-2024, there were 543 violent deaths from injuries sustained in Robeson County. Of these 543 deaths, 528 were NC residents (97.2%) and 497 were Robeson County residents (91.5%).

- There were 151 suicides (27.8%), 356 homicides (65.6%), nine unintentional firearm deaths (1.7%), 10 deaths from legal intervention (1.8%), and 17 deaths of undetermined intent (3.1%).

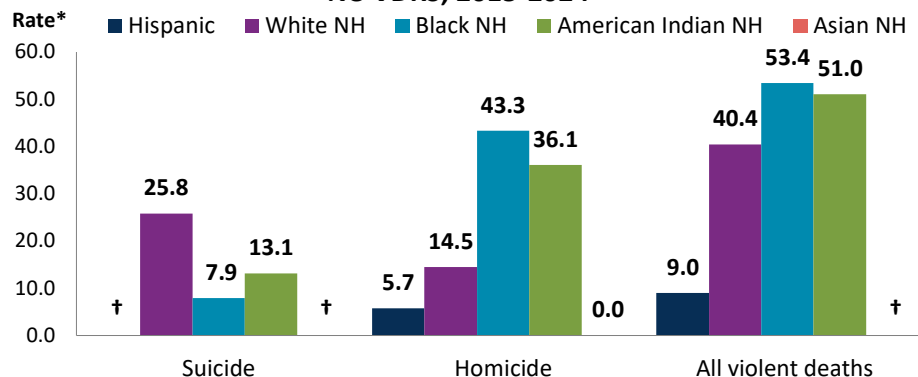
- In Robeson County, the suicide ratio was 9.4 times higher in males than in females, and the homicide ratio was 4.7 times higher in males than in females.

*Rate per 100,000 based on the county of injury occurrence. † Rate suppressed, 1-4 deaths.

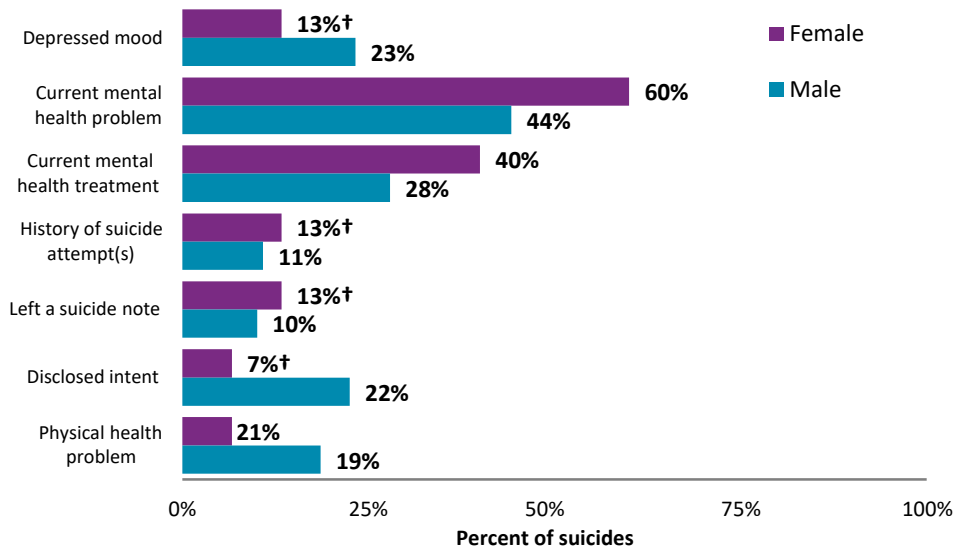

- The suicide rate was highest for non-Hispanic (NH) White victims (25.8 suicides per 100,000 population) followed by NH American Indian victims (13.1 per 100,000).

- In contrast, the homicide rate was highest among NH Black victims (43.3 per 100,000 population) followed by NH American Indian victims (36.1 per 100,000).

- Suicides and homicides displayed dissimilar age patterns. Homicide rates peaked among those aged 20-24 with 66.2 homicides per 100,000, while suicide rates peaked among those aged 75-84 with 21.4 suicides per 100,000.
- More than three quarters of homicides (86.2%) and almost two thirds of suicides (65.6%) involved firearms.
- Suspicion of intoxication was reported in 10.7% of homicides and 11.9% of suicides.
- For homicide incidents where one or more suspects were identified, the relationship of the victim to the suspect was known (current or former spouse/boyfriend/girlfriend, family, friend or acquaintance) more frequently for female (65.2%) than for male (49.7%) victims.

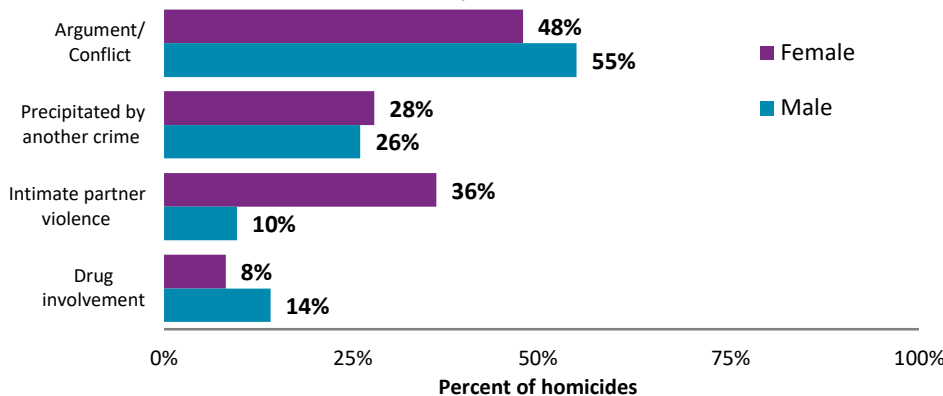
Circumstances of Suicides: Robeson County, NC: NC-VDRS, 2015-2024*



*Based on the county of injury occurrence, 95.4% of cases had circumstance information. One female and six males were missing circumstance information.

Circumstances of Homicides: Robeson County, NC: NC-VDRS, 2015-2024*



*Based on the county of injury occurrence, 92.7% of cases had circumstance information. Five females and 21 males were missing circumstance information.

- Twenty-three percent (23.3%) of male and 13.3% of female Robeson County suicide victims with circumstance information were characterized as being currently depressed when they died by suicide.
- Sixty percent (60.0%) of female and 44.2% of male suicide victims were characterized as having a current mental health problem.
- Females (13.3%) were more likely to have attempted suicide in the past as compared to males (10.9%).

- Arguments or conflicts were more likely to be a contributing factor for male homicides (54.7%) than for female homicides (47.5%).
- Twenty-eight percent (27.9%) of female homicides and 26.0% of male homicides were precipitated by another crime such as robbery, burglary, or drug trafficking.
- Intimate partner violence was a contributing factor in 36.1% of female homicides, but only 9.7% of male homicides.
