

NC Violent Death Reporting System

VETERAN SUICIDE IN NORTH CAROLINA, 2019-2023

The North Carolina Violent Death Reporting System (NC-VDRS) is a CDC-funded statewide surveillance system that collects detailed information on violent deaths that occur in North Carolina including: homicide, suicide, unintentional firearm deaths, legal intervention, and deaths of undetermined intent. NC-VDRS uses information from death certificates, medical examiner reports, and law enforcement reports to understand and aid in the prevention of violent deaths. - Veteran status was available for 99.2% of the 11,632 violent deaths that occured among NC residents ages 18 and older from 2019-2023.
- 1,602 (13.8%) of these deaths occurred among NC veterans. Most veteran violent deaths were suicides (82.6%).
- The average suicide rate from 2019-2023 was 2.7 times higher among veterans than non-veterans (41.3 and 15.5 per 100,000 respectively). Veteran suicide rates were consistently higher than non-veterans across all age groups.
- The suicide rate was highest for veterans ages 18 to 34 with a rate of 97.0 per 100,000, and was 6.2 times higher than the rate for non-veterans among the same age group.
- Of veteran suicides, 94.3% were male. The rate among male veterans was 2.0 times that of female veterans (43.7 and 21.7 per 100,000 respectively).
- Most veteran suicide victims were non-Hispanic (NH) White (82.6%), while 9.9% were NH Black and 7.5% were of another race/ethnicity.




*Other includes fall, drowning, fire/burns, motor and other transport vehicle, and other methods of death.


- Most suicides involved a firearm for both veterans (76.8%) and non-veterans (58.1%), however there was a much larger proportion of firearms used in veteran suicides.
- The second leading cause of suicide among North Carolina veterans was hanging (13.9%) followed by poisoning (5.8%).
- Roughly 2% of veteran suicides involved a method other than a firearm, hanging, or poisoning.






• A smaller proportion of veterans had a history of suicide attempt(s) (10.2%), and fewer had a substance use problem other than alcohol (8.7%) compared to nonveterans (19.0%, and 21.7% respectively).



 Among veteran suicides, many circumstances differed by age group.



• More veterans ages 18 to 34 had an intimate partner problem (49.1%) than older veterans (21.8%), and were more likely to have had a job-related problem (13.2%) than older veterans (5.4%).



• Veterans ages 18 to 34 were less likely to have left a suicide note (26.0%) than older veterans (31.1%).
