#### **Use EPA- registered Insect Repellents**

Use <u>EPA-registered insect repellents</u> with one of the active ingredients listed to the right.

Follow these tips for effective use:

- Always follow the product label instructions.
- Reapply repellent as directed.
- Do not apply repellent on the skin under clothing.
- If you are using sunscreen, apply sunscreen first and insect repellent second.
- When used as directed, EPA-registered insect repellents are proven safe and effective, even for pregnant and breastfeeding women.

#### **Active Ingredients**

- DEET
- Picaridin (known as KBR 3023 and icaridin outside the United States)
- IR3535
- Oil of lemon eucalyptus (OLE)—A plantderived ingredient
- Para-menthane-diol (PMD)
- 2-undecanone—A plant-derived ingredient

# **Tips for Babies & Children**

- · Use clothing that covers arms and legs.
- Cover strollers and baby carriers with mosquito netting.



#### When using insect repellent on your child:

- · Always follow label instructions.
- Do not use products containing OLE or PMD on children under 3 years old.
- **Do not** apply repellent to a child's hands, eyes, mouth, cuts, or irritated skin.

**Adults:** Apply repellent onto your hands and then apply to a child's face.



### **Wear Protective Clothing**

- Wear loose-fitting, long-sleeved shirts and pants.
- Wear clothing and gear treated with permethrin.
  - Permethrin is an insecticide that kills or repels mosquitoes.
  - Permethrin-treated clothing provides protection after multiple washings.
  - **Do not** use permethrin products directly on skin.

Mosquitoes rest in dark, humid places. Prevent mosquitoes from laying eggs inside your home and take the following steps:


- Once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out any items that hold water, such as vases or flowerpot saucers.
- · Use an indoor insecticide.
- Hire a pest control professional to treat areas inside your home.



#### Keep mosquitoes out

To keep mosquitoes outside of your home, you can:

- Install or repair and use window and door screens.
- Close doors, including garage doors. Do not leave doors propped open.
- Use air conditioning when possible.



**TIP** stagnant water weekly

**TOSS** unused containers

### Control mosquitoes outside your home

**Once a week**, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out any items that hold water:

- Tires
- Buckets
- Planters
- Toys
- Pools
- Birdbaths
- Flowerpot saucers
- Trash containers

Fill tree holes.







**Tightly cover** water storage containers:

- Buckets
- Cisterns
- Rain barrels



For containers without lids, use wire mesh with holes smaller than an adult mosquito.

Repair cracks or gaps in your septic tank if you have one.

Cover open vent or plumbing pipes.

# **Mosquito Reduction**



#### Kill mosquito larvae outside your home

Use <u>larvicides</u> to treat bodies of water that will not be used for drinking and cannot be covered or dumped out.

#### Kill mosquitoes outside your home

Use an outdoor <u>adulticide</u> to kill adult mosquitoes in areas where they rest (dark, humid areas).

When using larvicides and adulticides, always follow label instructions.
